I am very excited to begin as the Chapter Director for Washington DC. am a native Washingtonian, having received sacraments at

3 different parishes in our Diocese (St. Catherine Laboure, St. Andrew the Apostle, and Blessed Sacrament in Chevy Chase). The parish I call home now is in Southern Maryland at Jesus the Good Shepherd Church in Calvert County. I became a parishioner here after following my parents to what I used to call "the boonies" but to what I now call God's little piece of paradise on earth.

Our vastly different regions within the area is one of the great gifts of our

Archdiocese. We can span from the mountains to the rivers, to the bustling urban cities. The Body of Christ is what unites us all as musicians and leaders within our own parishes.

Over the past three years, it has been a challenge to find that unity amongst colleagues and friends. We have become creative in our outreach from home altars, to drive-thru confessions, to outdoor Masses and Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament. We became adept at Zoom, Google Meets, Facetime, and live streaming in an area of technology that we never dreamed we would explore as musicians. While for those musicians who have not ventured to an NPM sponsored event, they might say they are too overwhelmed. That given the still "pandemic" situation that has left many churches half full, or half-employed, there simply isn't enough time for the "extra." Those non-members do not realize that the "extra" is the food for the journey for us pastoral musicians.

In the gospel for the second Sunday of Lent, Jesus did not go up to the mountain alone. He has his disciples with him: Peter, James and John. "And he was transfigured before them; his face shone like the sun and his clothes became white as light" (Matthew 17:2). Sometimes our best reflections are done in the company of our colleagues. If we want to be transfigured, we need to have our own disciples around us who know and hear the burdens that musicians only other pastoral can understand.



# Let's Get Colloquial!

I attended the NPM's Winter Colloquium in Washington DC a couple of weeks ago. The presenter was Dr. Don Saliers, Theologian-in-Residence at Candler School of Theology, Emory University. Before joining the Candler faculty in 1974, he taught at Yale Divinity School, and has taught in summer programs at Notre Dame, Boston College, Vancouver School of Theology, St. John's University, and Boston University School of Theology. One of Don's areas of interest — there are quite a few — is the relationship between theology and liturgy. He is also an accomplished musician, and so brings that perspective to this dialogue as well.



I found this three-day event affirming, uplifting, and inspiring. I'll describe the setting first, then share a few pithy quotes from Don's presentations.

The colloquium took place at St.

Matthew Cathedral in Washington DC.

We met in a very pleasant room in what could be described as the parish center, adjacent to the Cathedral. But we held Morning and Evening Prayer, along with one Eucharistic Liturgy and an organ recital, in the Cathedral itself.

St. Matthew's is, to begin with, a study in contrast between its exterior facade and the interior. It sits, like every Catholic Church its age, against the sidewalk, about 12 or 15 steps higher than the street level. Three entrances face the street and you walk right into the back of the main worship space. There is no narthex, lobby, or vestibule.

The extremely subtle exterior gives not a whiff of a clue of what's inside, which is a symphony of mosaic images, vaults, marble in an array of colors, six smaller chapels, and a soaring dome at which I looked up from my eighth-floor hotel room a block away.

And the sound is as glorious as the look. A four-manual tracker organ, maybe 60 or 80 ranks, sits on the main floor (there is no balcony or gallery), having only recently been completed with its fourth division including a bombarde and a few of the other sounds that would be expected in a space as exuberant as this. You can't seriously operate a Cathedral without a bombarde.

The acoustics are live but smooth, and both music and speech receive a supportive welcome. It is an extravagant and amazing worship space.

Upon arrival, we were invited to play the organ just for fun. I played it, unworthily of course, and while the feel of the tracker action and the sound in this space were a joyous experience that I did not deserve, I nevertheless accepted this moment gratefully, as we must also do with salvation itself.

During the week the Cathedral's organist, Paul Hardy (no relation), offered a wonderful recital that truly explored the capabilities of the organ and its home.

Now to the context of the colloquium. I've only attended one other of these, some 15 or so years ago, just prior to the implementation of the current rendition of the Roman Missal. That event included a great deal of structured conversation at table, with reporting to the large group, etc. But this one was much more casual. Don simply spoke. His thoughts, which are many in number and profound in character, just roll out. He had and followed an outline, but I didn't see any notes. The guy was engaging and amazing.

Rather than try to reconstruct any of the talks, I'll share some quotes that I found insightful and provocative. Maybe you will too.

The title of the Colloquium was "Can Beauty Save Us?" and its focus was on the psalms.





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I concluded my time in DC with a visit to the African American Museum of the Smithsonian Institution.

#### Pithy quotes from Don Saliers:

There is music in the text itself. Do musicians train lectors?

The Psalms take direct aim at the gap between the world as it is and the world God has promised.

The psalms offer us the entire range of human emotion.

Always be on the alert for something you haven't heard before when praying the Psalms.

It is both a wonder and a scandal that most of the Church in the West has lost touch with the psalter...

Musical judgements are more than just musical. The are also Pastoral, Cultural, and Kinetic.

LITURGY: A performative, artistic, symbolic act that originates in the Liturgy of Jesus and therefore requires a living interaction between the verbal and the non verbal.

This art serves the divine intent and it is not meant to be admired in itself. (Aidan Cavanagh)

Christian Liturgy is an eschatological art, lured by God's promises.

"Playing Church while the world burns."

Lament and Praise belong together because they require each other!

It was really the perfect ending to this experience, evoking profound lament in some ways while offering new insights into a cultural and historical dynamic that has shaped our nation and continues to influence our time and our future as a nation.

Complete guidelines and requirements for this musical competition are available in English and Spanish.

The standard entrance fee is \$25. Submissions will be accepted through April 21, 2023 through this link. Only one entry per participant.




