

### DIRECTOR'S CORNER



The Third Sunday of Lent 2020 was the first Sunday of the pandemic shutdown in the Archdiocese of Washington. 
### Special Lenten Prayer Service

# MUSIC MINISTRY IN THE SILENCE:

### A reflection on the virtual workshop given by LTP in February 2021

During Lent, we as music ministers are called to pull back and consider how silence can be a reflective part of the liturgy. How is this done during COVID-19 when singing already is limited? Michael Ruzicki and Wendy Silhavy recently addressed this question and other elements to a virtual platform of eager music ministers called, "Ministering to the Silenced Assembly." Ruzicki and Silhavy shared pastoral advice, Holy Week preparations and Lenten ideas in this time of COVID-19.

We in the music ministry have been under a Lenten veil for some time. With congregational singing "prohibited," capacity of our worship spaces capped by social distancing, and woodwind/brass instruments strongly discouraged, we have lived the "Days of Lenten Journey" in a way Ricky Manalo never envisioned. Most of us have been struggling with balancing a virtual reality in our choirs, yet a full conscious (maybe active?) participation in our live liturgies.

Michael Ruzicki stated in his opening of this presentation, "in the face of adversity our truest identity shines forth." For good or for bad, the COVID pandemic made us look at what was working in the church and what needed work. The old plans we have put away may never be dusted off again if we wish to move forward in evangelization and ministry. It is important to evaluate and assess what we are doing NOW, what could be added, and what will remain ever ancient, ever new. Pope Francis has even remarked on this time for musicians as a time for listening so that something new can be reborn:

#### "Is the Silence we're living in an emptiness, or are we just in a phase of listening? Will the silence let a new song emerge afterward?"

As the presentation turned to Lent and Holy Week, Silhavy offered some ideas for incorporating the music ministry beyond the Mass. For instance, have an "off-duty" choir member write a blog about why the music is selected and how it fits with the readings. Or, maybe there is a music minister with an enormous amount of music appreciation or history, and they can lead a virtual presentation on music for your parish. Better yet, have what Wendy called a "Canto Divino" where the music ministry can break open the word with a drink over Zoom! While these ideas do not necessarily assist the Mass, they do support the liturgical community that is the parish.

As Wendy took us on a walk through Holy Week, she shared some elements to consider when planning during 2021. One element to consider is how to use the sound of the liturgy "aurally." Find creative ways to place a few choir members in different parts of the church if the space allows, so that you hear songs antiphonally. Or, use bells and handbells more for the Gloria on Holy Thursday and make it a point to ask your parishioners to bring anything to ring this year - shake your keys! - to participate in the aural sounds of Holy Week. If your parish is daring, perhaps use body percussion as an aspect of participation within the music (claps, snaps, stomps, etc). She also reminded us to consider using chant, which brings the text more forward in the music and "draws us in." Wedny advised us that Good Friday can have "noble simplicity" and that a pregnant silence can mean even more this year.

Also consider those coming on Easter for the first time when programing the hymns. The familiar music of "Jesus Christ is Risen Today" could be a lovely instrumental piece so that the assembly does not resent their non-participation in the singing of this age-old hymn.

In all aspects, we must use our digital communications to prepare our parish for the music, readings and rites of Holy Week. They will better know what they can and cannot do during the liturgy and will be drawn into the Paschal Mystery. As it is ever ancient and ever new for 2021.


Jennifer Kluge, NPM's Executive Director, lives in Silver Spring, MD. She brings over 20 years of management experience in higher education and nonprofit organizations.

This is also a good option for those who feel philanthropic about our organization and want to continue supporting us.

#### STANDARD

The standard membership is for those who are more invested in planning liturgies, more interested in professional growth opportunities, enjoy receiving *Pastoral Music* magazine, and are likely to want a discount on attending conferences. The STANDARD membership is \$119.

#### PREMIUM
