# **DIRECTOR'S CORNER**



How is it possible that another liturgical year has come to end? In the span of one week, we go from celebrating the triumphant power of Christ the King to anticipating and preparing for the mystery of the Incarnation. As pastoral musicians we are deeply tied to the rhythm of the liturgical year. In my experience, the start of Advent brings more hope, joy, and promise than the secular celebration of January 1<sup>st</sup>. Given the unprecedented restrictions and suffering placed upon on our church life due to the pandemic, the need for renewal and looking forward is even more acute than

seasons past. The new liturgical year is the perfect time to re-center our lives, take stock of our spiritual growth over the last year and look forward to the story of Christ retold again.

This beginning again is not possible without acknowledging the *yes*, the fiat of Mary, at the Annunciation. One of my favorite hymns for Advent is "The Angel Gabriel", an old Basque tune with a moving text. Verse three is the one that embodies this miraculous yes that started all of salvation history. "Then gentle Mary meekly bowed her head, "To me be as it pleaseth God', she said. 'My soul shall laud and magnify his holy name': most highly favored lady. Gloria! (If you are not familiar with this hymn, take a listen here.) She did not let fear of the unknown, fear of the angel in front of her or fear of the gigantic, history-changing task before her deter her *Yes*!

As we embark into this new liturgical year, may we find new places to say *yes* to Christ in our lives. May we be open to growth in our music ministries and to those in need around us. May we not be weighed down by the last 20 months of upheaval nor frightened of what may come. Let us, like Mary, continue to say *yes* in the face of the unknown. For in the end, Christ is King, and his reign began with the Holy Yes of Mary and the cry of tiny child so many years ago.

### FALL LITURGY DAY - LIVING DOCUMENT OR JUST HISTORY



It was a beautiful fall day on October 23<sup>rd</sup>, when NPM chapter members of Arlington and

Washington, D.C. were received with generous hospitality at St. Thomas More Cathedral; and then a well-prepared presentation by **Dr. John A. Romeri**, on the Constitution of the Sacred Liturgy (CSL), "Sacrosanctum Concilium". As past Arlington chapter director, Gene Harper introduced our speaker in great detail, it was clear that we were about to hear from an experienced colleague whose qualifications were more than just liturgical academia, but his lived experience, and his in-depth study that has led to this presentation. Dr. Romeri is most recently the Director of Music and Organist for Christ Cathedral Church in the Dioceses of Orange, California.

We began our morning with a mission: to refocus our ministry, by looking with fresh eyes at this, our Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy: the foundational, first document of the Vatican II Council. Morning Prayer was jointly led by chapter members. Afterward, Dr. Rick Gibala, Director Music at the Cathedral of St. Thomas Moore, gave some personal remarks about his friend and our speaker. Dr. Romeri then began with us all reciting the very prayer that started each day of the Vatican II Council, prayed by

2,500 Cardinals, Patriarchs of Eastern Catholic Churches, Archbishops, Bishops. The Council started its work on October 11, 1962 and produced 16 documents. This first document, the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy was approved on December 4<sup>th</sup>, 1963, approved by a vote of 2,147 to 4. Dr. Romeri asked us to consider, "This 134-page document is our Constitution. Is it a living document, or just a history?"

Deftly we moved through the document with highlights and side notes that helped to focus our understanding of how the Council was shaping the future, in bringing vigor to the

faithful in their lives and in their liturgy. The very familiar "full, active, and conscious participation" is from this

document. When reading these words, and many others in full context, it's easy to realize how important it is to refresh our minds with what the document actually says, resounding with relevance even 60 years later.

Dr. Romeri graced us with his friendly manner and refreshing perspective. Those of us in attendance were grateful for the opportunity to spend a delightful morning with him, and with each other.

He earned a master of arts in liturgical studies from St. John's University, Minnesota and a master of arts in Christian doctrine from Marquette University, Wisconsin. His bachelor of science in music education was granted by Quincy University, Illinois. Originally from Old Mines, Missouri, Timothy previously served as an editor and liturgical training consultant for Liturgy Training Publications with the Archdiocese of Chicago, IL, as the director of the Office of Liturgy for the Diocese of Salt Lake City, as the director of the Office of Worship for the Diocese of St. Cloud, and as director of Liturgical Programs at Marquette University. He has served as a high school teacher, written articles on pastoral liturgy, and presented workshops on liturgical formation, especially the Liturgy of the Hours and Christian initiation.
